





CAREER OPTIONS

Most Medical Administrative Assistant graduates go to work for a hospital or a doctor's office. A medical administrative assistant is often the first person a patient sees when entering a doctor's office or hospital; so, those who choose this career path should have friendly, understanding personalities. Some medical administrative assistants also handle billing, which means they use basic math skills on the job every day. Most medical assistants work full time, and some may work evenings or weekends to cover shifts in medical facilities that are always open.

SALARY

The average starting salary for most medical administrative assistants is \$31,000/year.

Learn how to perform the essential tasks of a culinary worker, including:

- » Inspecting and cleaning food preparation areas, such as equipment, work surfaces, and serving areas, to ensure food is handled safely.
- Ensuring food is stored and cooked at the correct temperatures by regulating the temperature of ovens, broilers, grills, and roasters.
- » Ensuring the freshness of food and ingredients by checking for quality, keeping track of old and new items, and rotating stock.
- » Learning the tools, equipment, and basic techniques used in cooking and baking.
- » Calculating measurements.



Many graduates also gain a state-issued license.

CAREER OPTIONS

Most Culinary Arts graduates go to work in the food service industry, often for restaurants and catering services, or for institutions, such as schools, hospitals, or cafeterias. Most work full time and are on their feet for their entire shifts, which often include early mornings, late evenings, weekends, and holidays.

SALARY

The average starting salary for most culinarians is \$23,000/year.



Most Electrical graduates go to work for licensed electricians or are self-employed. Electricians install and maintain electrical systems in homes, businesses, and factories, and their work can be both indoors and outdoors. Almost all electricians work full time, which may include evenings and weekends.

Students who complete a Homeland Security training area can earn nationally recognized credentials from the International Foundation for Protection Officers (IFPO) and a state-issued license.

CAREER OPTIONS

Most Security and Protective Services graduates work for private security companies that contract with businesses requiring secure facilities. Many positions involve working nights and weekends, with part-time and full-time opportunities. Security guards provide surveillance around the clock by working shifts of 8 hours or longer with rotating schedules. Those who work part time sometimes take a second job.

SALARY

The average starting salary for most security guards is \$23,000/year.
