WLC Students Attend Bridge Building Competition at NHTI

Twenty two students from WLC's Technology Education/Woodworking classes traveled to the New Hampshire Technical Institute on November 27 for the NHDOT's annual Bridge Building Competition. Participants in the competition construct popsicle stick and hot glue bridges over three feet long to strict design parameters. On the day of the event in Concord student bridges are tested to failure by gradually adding weights until they break, and the winners are judged by comparing bridge weight to the load they were able to support. Other categories in the event include classic and original bridge design. NHDOT Civil Engineer Emily Polychronopoulos, E.I.T. has worked closely with our students, visiting with presentations on engineering careers and the competition, and dropping off bridge building supplies.

The NH Department of Transportation's TRAC Bridge Building Competition is one in which our students have participated very successfully in the past. Re-instituting it in the Tech Ed curriculum affords our students an opportunity to develop and deepen their understandings of civil engineering, engineering design, and group-based planning and construction.

This year's competition served as an educational resource for WLC students, who completed research and design elements of the project before the competition and will construct their bridges using knowledge gained at the event. When completed, the NHDOT has offered to visit with the official testing apparatus so students will be able to compare their results against the earlier competitors. Students have been quite vocal about plans for success at next year's competitions.

WLC students went on a field trip to Job Corps in Manchester, NH. Job Corps is a training facility that is no cost to students and provides 'on the job' training in a variety of fields. Some of these programs include; Advanced Manufacturing, Hospitality/Culinary, Health Care (Certified Nursing Assistant, Clinical Medical Assistant and Medical Office Support), Construction (Electrical and Facilities Management), and Homeland Security. Job Corps also offers a residential option for students to live on campus at no charge, which also includes their food/meal plan. Additionally, Job Corps has a recreational facility with various clubs and sport teams. Job Corps assists students with job placement after completing their program and part-time work opportunities during their time at Job Corps. Students are able to work at their own pace and they have two years to complete their program. The feedback from students on this tour was that they like the variety of career opportunities and the free price tag.

Warriors Supporting Warriors

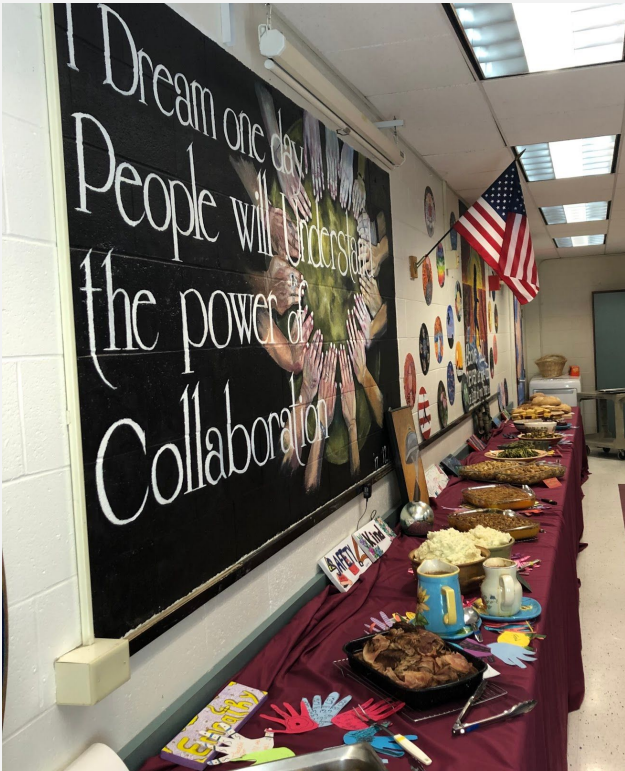
