#### Winter has arrived!

The upcoming weeks can become quite overwhelming as families prepare for family gatherings, special travels, and perhaps some shopping outings in preparation for special traditions. Routines often fall to the wayside along with daily reading practices, consistent homework support, and even family meals. At times families need to make a concerted effort to see that the rush and stresses of the holiday season do not seep into their child's daily routine and need for consistency.

Thank you for participating in parent conferences. One topic that is often discussed during conferences is homework. Homework serves the role of "purposeful practice" just like we have with music and sports. In order to become a better reader, writer, and mathematician, we need to practice as well. Taking time at home to read, write, and complete this "purposeful practice" is a major contributing factor to your child's success. Twenty minutes of reading each night adds up to over 122 hours of reading in a year! Thank you for your continued commitment to your child's learning. We appreciate it!

We are looking forward to more excitement in the month of December including the annual **Holiday Concert**. This year our first, second and third grade students will perform "40 Winks" on December 18<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 pm. The students have been busy rehearsing with Mrs. Barker their Music Teacher. This performance is going to be great!

If school is delayed, the buses will be later than usual to pick up the students. During a 2 hour delayed opening, students must not arrive at school prior to 9:40 am at FRES and 10:00 at LCS as there is no supervision available until that time. Morning Preschool classes at Lyndeborough Central School will be cancelled. If school is dismissed early it will be announced to the media and we will inform parents with our Power Announcement System. We will make every effort to be sure the students have a safe place to go. Take time to review with your child your family's plan for early release or late start. #### WINTER WEATHER

With the snow and frigid temperatures, please remember to dress your child appropriately. Recess is outside every day that the "feels like" temperature is above 12 degrees. During the winter months, the following outerwear is expected for our students during recess:

- Students are expected to wear all outerwear that comes from home (hats, gloves, mittens, snow pants, boots)
- In order to play in the snow, children must be dressed from "head to toe". Students are expected to wear snow pants and boots if they intend to play on any snow-covered area during recess. This includes the blacktop when it is snow covered or wet.
- In the event that the black top is completely clear of snow and slush, students then may be on this location in their "everyday" shoes.
- Students who do not have the appropriate outerwear during snow covered recess times will be asked to stay on the sidewalk. Thank you for your support with this. These expectations limit the wet pants, shoes, and socks that students get when not dressed appropriately, and helps them avoid having those wet clothes for the duration of the school day.
- We also ask you to label their clothing. If clothing is labeled, we make every attempt to match it to its owner.






Music News By Mrs. Barker

November has been an adventurous month with our Preschool and Pre-K students! The themes for this month were Thanksgiving, families, and colors. During Circle Time, the students focused on learning their colors while singing the "My Little Turkey" song. For Music Time, the students have been enjoying some of their favorite songs, such as "Row, Row, Row Your Boat" and "Head, Shoulders,

Knees, and Toes." The kids also painted wooden maracas and played them along with the music.

At the Art Center, the students used a paintbrush with brown paint to make a turkey and then used feathers to paint red and yellow feathers for the turkey. The Preschool and Pre-K turkeys are displayed within the classroom for the students to see and be proud of their creations. The kids painted frames to display their family pictures sent in by parents. To continue with the color theme, the students painted circles, squares, and triangles that will be hung in the hallway.

While at the Dramatic Play Center, the students pretended to prepare a Thanks-giving feast by roasting a turkey, cooking vegetables, toasting rolls, and baking pies. The kids pretended to be members of their families by dressing up as adults, caring for and bathing a baby doll, cooking, and having a tea party. Within the Block Center, the students worked cooperatively as they set up a doll-house by placing furniture into different rooms and having dolls interact throughout the house. The kids stacked Duplo Legos and practiced counting and naming colors upon request.

At the Library Center, the students looked at different books based on our themes of Thanksgiving, families, and colors. The students seem to particularly enjoy the *Thanksgiving Is for Giving Thanks* book by Margaret Sutherland, the *Is Your Mama a Llama?* book by Deborah Guarino, and the *Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What Do You See?* book by Bill Martin, Jr. and Eric Carle. While at the Sensory Table, the students used water and soap to bathe a baby doll. The kids experimented with whether cranberries would sink or float in water. They also played with colored oats and searched for hidden shapes.

During Table Top Time, the students made playdough turkeys using brown putty, feathers, and pipe cleaners. The kids practiced drawing shapes and writing their first names on top of tracing mats. The students scooped and filled cups and buckets with kinetic sand. The kids painted with watercolors and used pattern blocks to create objects. The students used lacing cards and matched colors and shapes.

Next month, we will be focusing on gingerbread and holiday celebrations.

Boy-oh-boy have we been busy in Kindergarten! Over the past month, we have really settled into our routines and formed a wonderful little community. We have also learned a lot! Some of us have even started to use what we know about letters and sounds to write words on our own! Additionally, we have learned about rhyming words. In Reader's Workshop, we have learned about various strategies that help us become great readers and have practiced using these strategies while reading "all about the world" books. We have also enjoyed reading, re-telling, and acting out various stories that we have read with the people in our classes. In the next coming months, we will dive into our unit on "storybooks".

In Math, we have continued to develop our ability to identify, write, and subitize numbers 0-10. We are also well into our unit on two-Dimensional shapes! Our field trip to Peabody Mills Environmental Center last month was a wonderful introduction to our current science unit on animals and animal habitats. We have already learned a lot about animals and the things they need to survive, including food and shelter.

Throughout the past month, we have enjoyed various things including: a field trip to the town library, a visit from our 4th grade reading buddies, a Sock Hop to celebrate the 50th day of school, and a Thanksgiving Feast!

In December, we are looking forward to our next visit with our 4th grade reading buddies, various holiday-themed activities, and a visit from Mrs. Claus herself!

First Grade News



First grade had a very exciting month. We have many things coming up that we are looking forward to! In Readers Workshop students are working hard to use a variety of strategies to solve new words. We are focusing on turning new words that we solve into words we can read in a snap. fiction unit.

In math we are continuing to work hard on our math facts. Please practice math facts to 10 anytime that you can with your student. We are also focusing on applying our math facts and math knowledge to solve story problems. We are wrapping up making ten and starting on the teens (ex. 10+4).

In science we have finished our forces unit. The students had a lot of fun exploring forces through a variety of hands-on experiments. We loved seeing the November STEAM projects. The students did a great job designing things that float! We loved hearing how students created their projects and testing them to see them float!

In December, we will be learning about holidays around the world. Throughout the month we will travel to different countries to explore their holidays and traditions.

Hello Second Grade Families.

We are so excited to find ourselves about one-third of the way through the school

year! The second graders have been learning to write and create narratives about their lives and topics that interest them. They have become better with capitalization and punctuation as well.

In reading, we have started our journey into non-fiction books. Second grade readers are learning to pay attention to details, ask questions about their reading, and determine what the book is about. They are jotting important and interesting facts as well as questions that they have about what they are reading.

In math we continue to build our fact fluency in addition and subtraction. We have learned how to add 2 digit numbers with regrouping. Next, we will transition into learning how to solve 2-digit subtraction problems with regrouping. Please encourage your second grader to practice math facts at home, either online (XtraMath) or any way that is fun for him or her.

We have begun to learn about U.S. Government and important U.S. Symbols. The second graders have been assigned a project that focuses on a specific U.S. symbol. It will be due on Monday, December 17th. Please encourage your child to read multiple books and jot down facts that he or she learns about the symbol. Students can present their findings in a poster or with a different visual display (such as a model with facts attached). We will be presenting these projects at school during the week of the 17th.



#### Tis' the Season to Practice Your Reading!

With the holidays upon us, many families struggle to find ways to maintain a consistent schedule for homework and reading. Here are two quick and easy strategies to help your students practice their reading while enjoying some holiday traditions.

Singing Christmas Carols – Some families enjoy singing carols and this is a way for your students to practice reading. When you sing carols, simply provide your student with a copy of the words. Singing will require them to practice their fluency and may even inspire conversations about the words and meanings of the carols. These conversations can help support their vocabulary and comprehension skills.

Turn the Captions on While Watching Holiday Specials – Many families allow their students to watch some of the holiday specials. One way to have students practice their reading is to turn the captions on your television during these specials. By turning the captions on, students can read the words that they are hearing on the TV program. This strategy has some of the same benefits as reading aloud to your students.

I hope all students and their families have a wonderful holiday season. And remember, books make wonderful gifts!!!

Art News

The students have been very busy creating some beautiful art at the FRES and LCS! This month both schools will be participating in a Wilton community project by decorating luminaries for the holiday event held the evening of Saturday, December 22. That night, the students can look for their luminara while strolling along Main Street and take in "It's a Wonderful Life" at the Wilton Theatre. All the children will be creating a holiday decoration or picture this month to create a festive spirit for our musical coming up on Tuesday, December 18.

The kindergarteners are working on a snowy, night time landscape collage. It is inspired by Vincent van Gogh's "Starry Night" and other night time paintings that he created. The LCS students didn't want you to forget what a FUN holiday turkey looks like so they drew and colored one using any color except for brown!

Besides our holiday art, the first graders are experiencing the art of Gyotaku printmaking. They learned that Japanese fishermen, over a 100 years ago, would record their catch by placing non-toxic sumi ink on their fish, place a thin rice paper over the fish and gently rub it to produce an exact image of the fish. Fins, gills and eyes, you can see them all on their prints! The children used various species of rubber fish and printing ink to create their own print on an underwater background. Second graders are making some delicious Gingerbread People to decorate for the upcoming musical. Brown paper cookie, thick white paint for frosting and oil pastels for candies and colored frosting! Third graders are learning about symmetry and asymmetry in art by creating some funny, fashionable, spooky and very creative Aliens. They will soon be floating on the walls outside of the third grade classrooms!

Fourth grade has been exploring the concept of scale by observing various types of seashells and enlarging them on an 18" x 24" piece of colored paper. No tracing shapes here! The basic shape of the shell is drawn, details are added, and then the students use expressionistic colors to create vibrant artworks! Colors are mixed and faded into one another to create interest and mimic the actual seashells. Fifth grade just finished experimenting with resist painting. They will be working on a winter scene that involves color mixing using paint and oil pastels. The scenes will include their favorite winter sports! Whenever I can, I try to make the student's projects connect to anything that is New England and our beautiful Atlantic Ocean. We are so fortunate to live in this part of our country!

Physical Education News

Students in Kindergarten are learning how to listen for and follow signals for basic games and activities. They are using various manipulatives for practicing sport skills like throwing and catching. They are exploring

movement in their own space and beginning to be able to exercise for a longer period of time. First graders are becoming more accustomed to participating in organized physical activities. They can exercise the whole time and are beginning to increase the quality of their movement. They are learning to perform fundamental locomotor skills that are the foundation of movement. Second graders are able to perform locomotor skills like skipping and shuffling with increased quality of movement. They are learning about the levels of pace to better control over their bodies in space. They are improving their ability to take turns and play with others. Third graders are demonstrating competency in fundamental exercise skills. They have increased their level of fitness and quality of exercise. They are learning about the zones of exercise which refer to the level of exertion required to improve physical fitness. Fourth and fifth grade are learning how to self assess their performance in physical activities. This includes the zone of exercise they achieved, the quality of their skill practice habits, how engaged in the activities they were, and willingness to challenge themselves for self improvement. Students have continued to practicing sport related skills and lead-up activities. They are demonstrating competency in exercise and movement skills.


