VERVIEW OF THE MONGOL EMPIRE

The Mangal Empire, established by Genghis Khan In the 13th century, was one of the largest and most powerful empires in history. Stretching from Asia to Europe, It covered a vast territory and brought together diverse cultures and peoples under one rule.

Genghik Khan, born as Temulin, come from a nomadic tribe in Mongala. He united the Mongal tribes through his military provess and strategic leadership. Genghik Khan's army was known for tils exceptional horsemanship and archery skills, which allowed them to conquer vast terificates. The Mongals were also skilled in slege warfare, using innovative toolics to caputh contribed critics.

Despite its eventual decline, the Mongol Empire left a lasting impact on the regions it conquered. The empire facilitated cultural exchange, promoted trade, and fostered religious tolerance. The Mongols played a significant role in connecting the East and the West, leaving a legacy that shaped the course of world history.



The Christians say that their God is Jesus Christ, the Muslims Muhammad, the Jews Moses, and the Buddhiss the Buddhis. ... And I worship all flow; so whosh jud flow in who is greatest in heaven

In 1231 the Mangals invaded Karea from their base in north China. They demanded that the Karean court surrender and send local products as gills. The Koreans did this, but the Mangals weren't satisfied. This letter is from the Mangal ruler of north China, Chinagis Khari's third son. It asks for more gills, as well as young men and women to be sent as hostages. The Koreans did as the Mangals asked, and there was peace for six months. In the end, however, the Koreans revolted and resisted the Mangals. They finally surrendered in 1259.

Our great amy has been separated from home for many days, and the clothes that we have been wearing are now all swor out. You are to consider this and bring one million military uniforms. 

The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gove the last Juli measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain—that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom—and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.


