## The Story behind the Red Ribbon Symbol

Enrique "Kiki" Camarena grew up in a dirt-floored house with hopes and dreams of making a difference.

Kiki worked his way through college, served in the Marines and became a police officer. When he decided to join the U.S Drug Enforcement Administration, his mother tried to talk him out of it. "I can't not do this," he told her. "I'm only one person, but I want to make a difference."

The DEA sent Kiki to work undercover in Mexico investigating a major drug cartel believed to include officers in the Mexican army, police and government. On Feb. 7, 1985, the 37-year-old agent left his office to meet his wife for lunch. Five men appeared at the agent's side and shoved him into a car. One month later, Kiki's body was found in a shallow grave. He had been tortured to death.

In honor of Kiki's memory and his battle against illegal drugs, friends and neighbors began to wear red badges of satin. The National Federation of Parents, Inc sponsored the first nationwide campaign that same year. In 1988, with Nancy Reagan as honorary Chairperson, an eight-day Red Ribbon Week was proclaimed by the Congress of the United States. The red ribbon has become a symbol of awareness, a sign that we choose to strive for drug-free lives.
