WILTON

The proposed budget would create an estimated increase in the tax rate of \$.22

for the average home in Wilton valued at \$217,000.

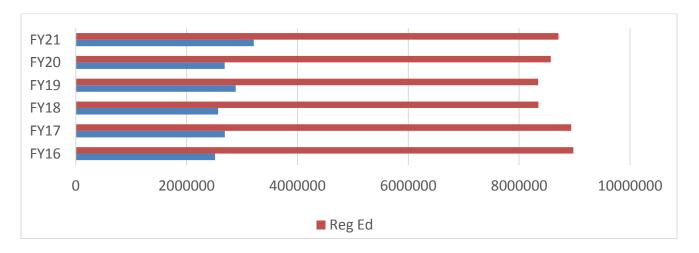

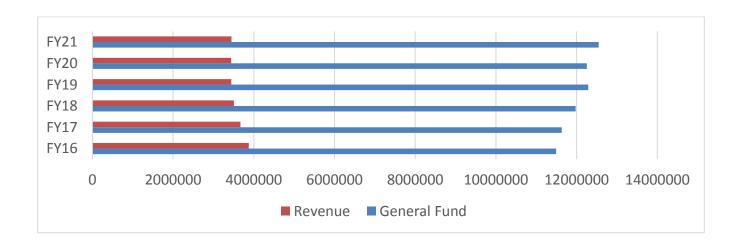

Moderator called for discussion

Ruth Smith of Wilton

Stated the data is misleading, there is no data on percentages for HS students. Suggested we create revenue by putting our facilities to work.

A Wilton resident asked that it be looked at differently, to look at the increases from this time last year, stating there will be an amendment proposed that will take three things into consideration: Consumer price index

Approve and allow CBA

Retire the bond back to the taxpayers.

This will result in an approximate 411,000. reduction in the proposed budget.

Mark Hunter of Wilton asked why the Climate Culture program was removed, stating that qualified volunteers are available to do this,

Ms. Browne responded the item was removed through a suggestion for the accreditation program. Mr. Lane came across a free program and we could fulfill that requirement other ways.

Karen Walker of Wilton proposed an amendment to warrant Article 4 2nd by Sara Spittle

Proposed amendment for the budget number to be 12,644,720.00

Discussion

Ms. Browne stated both boards worked hard on this, held a lot of meetings and both voted unanimously for this.

Ms. Browne asked if there are suggestions where to reduce.

Karen walker stated this will force the board to look more closely at areas to reduce.

Kevin Boette stated that the board started in September, had the special meeting in November to address the error, met with teachers, tax payers, spent a lot of time going over the budget line by line, programs were cut, a lot of thought and detail was put into this; to arbitrarily subtract this now will do a lot of damage to the students. Mr. Boette asked for specifics where these cuts will come from and what is being requested.

Lisa Post stated this decision was made to avoid another special vote, we were told we were working off wrong numbers and wanted to make sure we are on the right track.

Ralph Bushman of Wilton asked about the increase in salaries; what is the percentage of teachers to administration?

Ms. Browne answered, it is roughly the same, Mr. Lane will look up the info.

Dan Nelson of Wilton spoke against the amendment, stating a 250,000 home with this amendment will have an increase of 4.08 a week, 15.20 a month; stating the committee has done their job.

Sally Curran spoke in favor of the amendment referencing a list including the following possible reductions:

Travel and conferences
New Equipment
Professional Development
Curriculum Coordinator
SAU performance incentives

Jeff Jones replied not all of those items are included in the final budget.

A Wilton resident suggested fundraising for one-time spending like furniture and roofs.

A Wilton resident asked why the cost per student is so high.

Mr. Lane responded, referring to the pupil expenditure slides, and the district staff slides, pupil expenditure, we rank 9th out of 51. We are lower than schools that are similar to us. We Cannot compare us to larger schools. Mr. Lane referred to OOD day programs and how much they cost; approximately 80,000 for one student, part is due the scale and decisions the community has made, smaller class sizes, right now we have larger class sizes.

Fran Bujak of Lyndeborough spoke against the amendment stating that this reduction will not be anything insignificant, it will be teachers; class sizes will go up. Money will be in our pockets but will be taken away from our students.

Peter Howd of Wilton questioned salary benefits and SPED services to reconcile the bar graphs, the numbers don't seem to match.

Business Administrator Lizabeth Baker explained those salaries come from all different function codes.

Sarah Spittle of Wilton demanded the board look at the numbers and a solution and make difficult decisions asking them to do more and think more creatively.

Jen Weston of Lyndeborough asked why there is only talk of cutting student services, why not administration cuts? Why weren't things cut that could have been?

A Wilton resident expressed confusion with the budget numbers.

Karen Walker of Wilton stated the pupil cost slide doesn't include transportation and asked what it would take for us to be performing in the top 20%.

Mr. Lane answered he is not satisfied with our test scores and it will take three to five years for that change and it is beginning to happen; if you look at what we are doing our students are at or above grade level expectations, changing the academic culture in schools takes time. The RTI program helps students catch up. We are on the road to getting where we need to be.

A Wilton resident called the question. Moderator will allow two more questions

A Lyndeborough resident asked how we are breaking down per student. And inquired about the climate and culture program.

Ms. Lemire answered the climate and culture is grant funded to continue.

Mr. Lane responded per pupil does not include OOD and transport, it is difficult to determine that break down number, all students are different; explained info is available on the website.

Pam Altner of Lyndeborough asked about administrative costs and any proposed cuts.

Mr. Lane replied we are not required to have a technology coordinator, Curriculum coordinator all others are required, and we do need a technology and curriculum coordinator.

Diane Foss of Wilton asked about teachers being paid for Professional Development.

Mr. LoVerme replied the next warrant article will cover the teacher's contracts and that teachers are paid for professional development.

A resident requested a breakdown for Administrators to Teachers.

Mr. Lane replied Administration 12.8%, teachers 80%, other Paras, support staff.

Moderator read amendment to reduce the proposed budget amount to 12,644,720 a reduction of 411,444

Voice vote was inconclusive, moderator called for hand vote.

Results of hand vote on amendment to Warrant Article 4
Amendment passed 135 yes/ 90 No

Ms. Baker spoke on three types of budgets Strategic, Maintenance and Correction. This being a correction budget, this is a year to correct.

A Wilton resident asked what happens if the budget is voted down.

Mr. Lane replied a motion needs to be made with a dollar figure to move forward and vote again.

Mike Demers of Wilton asked about tuitioning kids out.

Mr. Boette replied if we tuition out we will have no say, we will just be writing a check.

Emily Hutchison of Wilton proposed a reconsideration of the amendment vote 2nd by Bob Newton of Lyndeborough.

Charlie Post of Lyndeborough requested the names be read for the request for a ballot vote.

Moderator read the following names:

Alison Dumont of Lyndeborough asked why 10 people can decide we have a ballot vote.

Mr. Lane replied that is by statue it only requires five signature to request a ballot vote.

Bruce Houston read from Roberts Rules of Order that a motion to reconsider can only be made by someone on the prevailing side of the vote.

Moderator stated we have no way of knowing how someone voted.

Emily Hutchison motioned to amend the budget back to original amount, 2nd by Bob Newton of Lyndeborough

Harry Daily of Wilton requested a decision on ballot, voice or hand vote going forward.

Moderator read a request for all warrant articles for SAU 63 District meeting on March 7, 2020 be made by ballot vote. The following names were read:

Collective bargaining agreement with the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative Teachers Association

To see if the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative School District will vote to approve the cost items included in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative School Board and the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative Teachers' Association which calls for the following increases in salaries and benefits at the current staffing levels over the amount paid in the prior fiscal year, 2020-21 \$114,834 and further to raise and appropriate the sum of \$114,834 for the 2020-21 fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits required by the new agreement over those that would be paid with current staffing levels. (Majority Vote Required)

Mr. LoVerme moved that Warrant Article 5 be approved as read 2nd by Mr. Ballou

Mr. LoVerme spoke using a slide presentation.

Lyndeborough is responsible for 27.295% of the cost which is \$31,344.

If the contract is passed, a home owner in Lyndeborough with a home valued at \$250,000 will have an estimated annual tax increase of \$45 or \$3.75 per month.

The total cost of the contract is \$114,834.

Wilton is responsible for 72.705% of the cost which is \$83,490.

If the contract is passed, a home owner in Wilton with a home valued at \$250,000 will have an estimated annual tax increase of \$50 or \$4.17 per month

This is a one-year agreement with the teacher's association which includes 60 members that are teachers, school counselors, librarians and nurses. The agreement provides a 2.7% average increase in salary for members ranging from \$850 to \$1,700. The teachers have agreed to add one professional day to enhance the collaborating of teachers throughout the district. Separate from the contract, the teachers through a memorandum of understanding will work with the district's administration to create a professional development committee to ensure that the needs of the district and its' staff are met.

There has been concerns about our schools voiced by the community and what kind of education they offer:

Over the past five years four students have dropped out and not completed our program. This is less than one-half of one percent

The percentage of drop outs is half the state average according to information listed on the Department of Education's website and significantly lower than national rates.

The best way to highlight the efforts of our teachers is to demonstrate the accomplishments of our graduates. WLC Graduates are currently employed by NASA, Space X, Georgetown University, BAE Systems, Fidelity, Standard Power of America, Security Industrial Specialists, University of New Hampshire, Southern New Hampshire University, Gordon College, New Hampshire Ball Bearing the United States Air Force, Army, Marines and the National Guard.

If the warrant article passes, Lyndeborough residents would be responsible for \$40,943 of the total warrant article. The tax impact would be an additional 24 cents to the tax rate. This would create an estimated annual tax increase of \$60.00 or a monthly increase of \$5.00.

If the warrant article passes, Wilton residents would be responsible for \$108,073 of the total warrant article. The tax impact would be an additional 26 cents to the tax rate. This would create an estimated annual tax increase of \$65.00 or a monthly increase of \$5.41.

The WLC School District created a Capital Improvement Plan several years ago to make sure that the District's investment in its' facilities was taken care of. The projects for the upcoming year will be to:

- Continue the roofing project at WLC
- Renovate bathrooms at WLC
- Replacing the dishwasher in the cafeteria at WLC

The total estimated cost for these projects is \$118,450.

As of January 2020, the balance in this account is \$108,922.46

After the projects are completed there would be a balance of about 140,000. With future projects coming up having a greater expense, building up this account will decrease the need for larger requests in the future.

Mrs. Lemire spoke on Warrant Article 8 using a slide presentation

If the warrant article passes, Lyndeborough residents would be responsible for \$27,295 of the total warrant article. The tax impact would be an additional 16 cents to the tax rate. This would create an estimated annual tax increase of \$52.50 or a monthly increase of \$4.38.

If the warrant article passes, Wilton residents would be responsible for \$72,705 of the total warrant article. The tax impact would be an additional 17 cents to the tax rate. This would create an estimated annual tax increase of \$55.00 or a monthly increase of \$4.58.

This fund was created to offset the cost for unanticipated special education incurred after the budget was created and approved. In the 2018-19 school year the fund was accessed for the first time offsetting over \$170,000 in unanticipated costs. The intent of the school board is to bring the fund up to a cap of \$300,000 over the coming years.

The current balance in the account is \$46,970.

Kevin Boette proposed an amendment for 300,000 to the Capitol Reserve fund from general taxation, referencing the budget cut from the prior vote; to be sure there are enough funds to cover any unanticipated expense 2^{nd} by Mr. LoVerme.

Dan Nelson of Wilton spoke in favor of the amendment, stating concerns with going over budget.

Charlie Post of Lyndeborough stated that if need be an emergency meeting could be called.

Barry kemmerer of Lyndeborough asked how long it takes to get all the paperwork and costs involved to address the needs of a new special needs student.

Mr. Lane replied the first 45 days is in place while we evaluate the needs, we are responsible for the costs, we are required by law to service that student.

Karen Grybko of Lyndeborough stated this fund was originally set up for unexpected SPED OOD placement and asked when did this change to anything SPED.

Mrs. Lemire replied some costs are through the RISE and Life Skills programs that we service in district that would have been OOD in the past.

Kevin Boette stated the state and federal government has money for SPED and we need to push for our funds.

Dan Nelson requested ballot vote on amendment. Moderator read the following five names:

Mr., Ballou spoke on Warrant Article 9 using a slide show presentation

If the warrant article passes, Lyndeborough residents would be responsible for \$8,189 of the total warrant article. The tax impact would be an additional 5 cents to the tax rate. This would create an estimated annual tax increase of \$12.50 or a monthly increase of \$1.04.

If the warrant article passes, Wilton residents would be responsible for \$21,811 of the total warrant article. The tax impact would be an additional 5 cents to the tax rate. This would create an estimated annual tax increase of \$12.50 or a monthly increase of \$1.04.

After it was identified, the budget committee recommended to the school board that an audit be done to determine the cause of the budget deficit identified in the amount of \$305,466 in the current school year. The intent of the audit is to determine the cause of the issue at hand and to make sure that this does not happen again. The budget committee and the school board felt it should be left up to the voters to determine if they wished to incur this expense.

Mr. Ryan spoke on the talk on social media being not true. The business administrator saw something was not right. Mr. Ryan said he made the motion to have a forensic audit so we will know what went wrong. The Chairs and Co-Chairs of the budget and School Board committee had a conference call meeting with the regular auditors, they informed the committee they saw nothing wrong criminally but did see procedures not in place and suggested putting procedures in place instead of a forensic audit. Mr. Ryan encouraged the citizens to attend budget and school board meetings throughout the year and to work together as a community.

Ms. Post spoke in favor of the forensic audit, stating she wants to know where the money went wrong.

Karen Walker of Wilton proposed an amendment to Warrant Article 9 to add the following wording:

The scope of which review shall be determined by a committee comprising of two members of the WLC Budget Committee and one member of the WLC School Board, reporting to the School Board, and which shall be performed by a firm that has not conducted a WLC financial audit in the past five fiscal years.

Motion to amend was 2nd.

Fran Bujak stated this should be invalid because it changes the intent of the article and using a committee and reporting back is illegal.

Ms. Walker withdrew her amendment 2nd was also withdrawn.

The start of March turned out to be very interesting with the new virus, COVID 19. As everyone knows, we didn't know much about it except for that it spreads quickly, and the outcomes could be serious.

Mr. Lane and his administration staff responded quickly when Governor Sununu shut the schools down and we went 100% remote. In a short turnaround time, the teachers prepared to teach remotely and the students started back to school online. One of the best reasons for such a quick turnaround is the 1-1 electronic devices. For the students that didn't have the internet the staff responded rather quickly, making sure that all students got the best possible education. Also, the lunch program had to continue and without any problems food service personnel put together meals to include breakfast and lunch so that students would not go without these two meals.

Graduation went off smoothly, holding it at the Drive-In in Milford where parents, family members, and friends were able to attend. Congratulations to the 30 graduates, Class of 2020.

With all of this going on the district had reductions in expenditures with no bus service, no sports and reductions in utility costs. With the reduction in expenditures and unanticipated revenue, the unexpended fund balance for the school year was \$840,991. The funds were divided according to the apportionment formula to both Lyndeborough and Wilton to go towards tax relief.

During the summer, the district administration team had to come up with a plan for the start of the new school year 2020-21 while staying within the budget. After receiving feedback from parents as well as school board approval, students were offered 3 choices; go to school 5 days, hybrid- 2 days in class and 3 remote or 100% remote. Three elementary school teachers were assigned to be specifically as remote teachers to handle grades 1-5. 70 % of all students chose to be in school five days, 13% chose to go to school remotely and 17% chose the hybrid option.

The holiday season came around and with the recommendation of a newly formed committee, the School Board voted to hire four long term substitute teachers to cover for staff that would be out due to quarantine or out with COVID symptoms. This allowed the district to remain open while other districts had to go remote. WLC was a leader in the state making this decision.

The district received federal COVID money for COVID related tasks and upgrades that were necessary to keep the students and staff safe as well as federal money for every student in the town eligible for a free lunch. Funds in excess of \$40,000 have been received to offset costs for the implementation of our educational program which further reduced the burden on the citizens of Lyndeborough and Wilton.

In an effort of cooperation, the School District worked with the Town of Wilton to move the voting for both the Primaries and the National Election to the High School. The District was able to keep both the students and the voters safe by having students learn remotely. We are continuing to meet the town's needs for voting and keeping social distancing by having town elections this March at WLC.

Dear Residents of Wilton and Lyndeborough,

We commend the efforts of the School Board, Superintendent, Administration, Staff and Teachers in handling the challenges of 2020. We offer our appreciation and thanks for the dedication and perseverance in overcoming the obstacles in educating our students due to the COVID 19 virus.

The FY 2019-20 school year ended with a surplus of \$565,841.51, this included the \$184,811 Special Meeting Funds which was returned to the taxpayers. Our schools began remote learning in March and continued through the end of June. This provided saving in the areas of maintenance, transportation, support staff, co-curricular activities and contract services. There were additional expenses in food service which were offset by additional revenue from the CARES Act.

The FY 2020-2021 proposed budget presented at last year's District Meeting was reduced by \$411,444 by ballot vote of the public which provided an Operating Budget of \$12,759,554 including the previously approved CBA of \$114,834. Warrant Articles presented and passed were \$100,000 to the SPED Fund and \$150,000 in the Roadway Capital Reserve Fund. Staff reductions, salary savings in new hires, and delayed maintenance made up the majority of the reductions that needed to be met. Expenses associated with COVID 19 are being tracked to apply for reimbursement through the CARES Act Fund. We are currently six months into the school year and do not anticipate any issues with the FY 2020-2021 budget.

The Budget Committee supports investments in curriculum, technology, buildings and appropriate planning for the future. We continue to support the School Board in their commitment to not transfer money and move line items within the budget so that the District can better understand our expenses. We strive to provide the best education possible for our students while being aware of the financial impact on the taxpayers and our Towns.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Nine days after our last Town Meeting Governor Sununu put all schools in New Hampshire into a remote setting for the remainder of the 2019-20 school year due to the COVID-19 epidemic. In a three-day period, our staff went from the traditional model of delivering instruction to a model that none of us have ever had to implement at this scale in the history of public education. Thanks to the forethought of the School Board in 2015, our students had been introduced to the technology that would allow them to access their education remotely. These experiences allowed our staff to reach out to students in their homes. There were some glitches and we had to figure out how to solve problems as they came up. Grades 2-12 were provided with Chromebooks in order to meet with their teachers daily. Kindergarten and First Grade were given hard copy materials and teachers met with full classes as well as individual students to keep things moving forward.

This new reality of remote instruction had other ramifications:

- With the students not being in our buildings and participating in co-curricular activities, the District did not have to pay for certain services in their entirety.
- The Federal Government did not change the requirements to provide lunches for student who qualified for free/reduced lunch and breakfast programs. Our food service staff kept working to ensure that students were provided with meals as most parents came to pick them up along with families who were in need had meals delivered to their homes daily.
- With additional funds from the Federal Government, the District was able to recoup costs for expenditures that were incurred to be able to meet the needs of students.
- Financially, in a school year that was very concerning, the District ended up with a fund balance of over \$800,000 which was returned to the Towns with the ability to lower the tax burden to our citizens.
- Our graduation ceremony was not held at WLC for the first time. When many schools were
 delaying a graduation ceremony or doing it in small groups, the WLC Class of 2020 had the full
 class in attendance while each student received their diploma at the Milford Drive-In movie theater.

As the new school year approached, the School Board reached out to parents to find out what they needed as the school year began. It was clear that the majority of parents wanted to have their children back in school as the fall semester began. It was also clear that a number of parents had concerns about sending their children back to school regardless of what precautions and mitigations could be put into place. The School Board chose to implement a program to meet the needs of all students. This three pronged program allowed for students to be in school, fully remote or to have a schedule with two or three days per week.

It should be noted that none of this could have worked without the dedication to purpose of our teachers and staff. A great deal has been asked of the staff in every respect whether it has been classroom instruction or sanitizing the buildings. This combined effort from every staff person allowed students and parents to feel confident that whatever model of instructional delivery was chosen, kids were put first.

Seeing the complication of keeping schools open with the need to quarantine staff, the School Board authorized the increase in substitute teacher pay and the hiring of up to four substitutes on a long term basis at a daily rate equal to first year teachers. These long term substitutes needed to be certified teachers or in a teacher certification program. While we have had to go remote due to some situations for a short period of time, the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative School District has maintained in school instruction while other school districts in our area have not.

With all of this, our enrollments have actually held steady this year and have increased since last year. Looking at our history we are seeing a trend in an increase in our enrollment while other school districts are declining:

The District welcomed new senior staff as we began the school year.

Robert Mullin came on board as the Business Administrator with experience from Massachusetts.

Peter Weaver was named the Principal of WLC Middle/High School coming to us with years of experience in New Hampshire.

Bob LaRoche, who served as Interim Principal at FRES in 2019-20, was named as the Principal at FRES.

This will be my last report as I am leaving the District at the end of the 2020-21 school year. I am grateful that I have been able to support the children of Lyndeborough and Wilton for the past five years.

Student Support Services Annual Report

The Student Support Services Department provides services and support for students identified with educational disabilities, English Speakers of Other Languages, and for students who are experiencing homelessness in the district. In addition to instructional support, the department provides evaluation services, transition support, assistive tech support, and resources/training for staff at our three school sites.

Our trained professionals (special educators, speech/language pathologists, occupational therapists, physical therapist, school psychologist and BCBA) work collaboratively with all staff to provide the services and support required to ensure student access to education in an inclusionary model that supports the mission of the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative School District.

Our teams monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of their service delivery systems and adjusts programs to ensure that all identified students have the opportunity to achieve success. Our RISE (Reaching Independence through Structured Environments) program, serving students on the Autism Spectrum and in need of Life Skills programming, continues to provide quality services for all students from Pre-school through graduation or age 21. As a district, we continue to strengthen all of our programs by making a conscious effort to provide the best programming using sound educational philosophies and practices with an eye toward responsible fiscal practices.

As director, I maintain frequent contacts with all of the administrative team and I visit our programs at least 4 times per week to meet with teachers & staff and observe what is working well, what challenges we face, and to develop ways to improve our service delivery and programs to our students & families.

Our priority areas for our department this year have been:

- Expanding the recently approved High School RISE/Life Skill program to include more community outreach and volunteer/internship opportunities
- Increase Student Support Services collaboration among all departments throughout the district and with our parents and the greater community
- Continue to review of all Student Support Services areas to maximize effectiveness and address areas of improvement

We have tremendous programs and dedicated staff teaching our students each and every day. I look forward to continuing to serve our students, families and staff as your director in our quest for an enriching and personalized educational experience for each of our students every day. FRES Annual Report

Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative School District provides a safe and educational environment that promotes student exploration, critical thinking, and responsible citizenship.

Florence Rideout Elementary School will strive to accomplish our mission by committing to:

- Encourage students to reach their potential and become responsible and productive citizens.
- Prepare, challenge, and empower our students to be life-long learners.
- Provide a safe and diverse learning environment.

The New Hampshire State Assessments measures each student's proficiency in relation to the NH State Standards for English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science. Our third, fourth, and fifth grade students have performed at or above the state average in all areas measured by this assessment. The efforts of every member of the Wilton-Lyndeborough community play important roles as we continue to work towards making steady growth and improvement. The spring assessments were rescheduled for the fall of 2020 and our students put forth a strong showing as we worked through the pandemic.

The pandemic that was brought on by COVID 19 impacted student learning on a large scale. The mode and pacing of the instruction and assessment had to change to meet restrictions brought on by the disease. The teaching staff were involved in every aspect of training in fully remote teaching and as the 2020-2021 academic year began, most FRES teachers worked in person while three staff members were relegated to full remote. Student progress is being monitored closely and intervention services utilized when necessary.

The curriculum utilized at LCS and FRES is a Balanced Literacy Workshop model of Readers and Writers Workshops with Lucy Calkins Units of Study being the main focus for teachers. The new science program, Project Lead the Way was introduced and we found the need to augment it with an online subscription called Mystery Science as it is well-suited to online learning. The Envisions Math Program is in its first full year of use.

We continue to look at our programs, instruction practices, and materials to identify areas in need of improvement. Our goal in developing the well-rounded student includes improving technology both in school as well as with devices that may travel home.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative School District Wilton, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and aggregate remaining fund information of the Wilton-Lyndeborough Cooperative School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

As discussed in Note 2-C to the financial statements, in fiscal year 2020 the School District adopted new accounting guidance, Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 84, *Fiduciary Activities*. Our opinions are not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Matters

Management's Discussion and Analysis – Management has omitted a Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements.
